

5 Charge Capture Myths

That every physician should know

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Introduction

Charge capture is an important topic among healthcare providers. According to a recent [HFMA survey](#), many healthcare finance executives say revenue integrity is the leading priority for their organizations—but less than half have established revenue integrity programs.

Everyone has their preferred charge capture workflow, and there's no shortage of supposed tech solutions on the market. But with all the information swirling around about charge capture, several worrying myths have taken root.

It's important to be aware of the different types of charge capture misconceptions that exist. 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Myth #1

Paper-Based Charge Capture Processes Still Work

Doctors are used to jotting down notes by hand when consulting with patients, then turning those notes into charge capture codes at a later time for billing. This is the way it's always been done, and for many physicians that means it's the way it should be done.

The truth is, paper-based processes simply no longer compete in a digital world.

Paper-based processes lead to lost charges as notes get misplaced or improperly marked as already billed. **On average, healthcare providers estimate they lose 3% to 5% of their potential revenue due to inefficiencies in their charge capture process.** While loss rates vary widely for individual practices, [the US hospital system as a whole loses \\$68B annually to billing mistakes](#)—mistakes that could be avoided through a better charge capture process.

Paper also leads to headaches when it comes to billing audits. When, not if, a payer audits a practice, they expect definitive evidence that shows the billed service was actually rendered. Side by side, a standard CPT code recorded two minutes after seeing a patient looks more convincing than notes on a napkin scanned a few days after seeing the patient.

Additionally, it is very hard for a practice to show HIPAA compliance with a paper process. When HIPAA data is digital, the logging and monitoring of that data is required so that a practice can show only the right people were seeing the data at the right time.

Myth #2

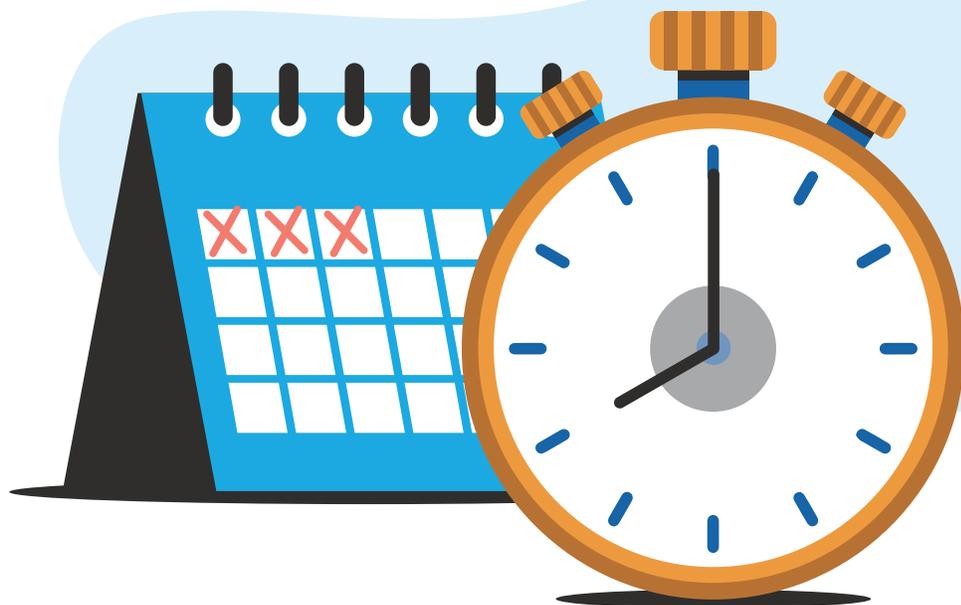
Billing Lag is Just Part of Doing Business

Billing lag is the space between seeing a patient and receiving their payment, whether it comes from the individual or their insurance provider. It's something physicians are all too familiar with, and many accept it as an inescapable inconvenience.

By digitizing your charge capture process, you can dramatically reduce billing lag times.

You can enter claims with correct CPT codes on a tablet or mobile device immediately after rendering services and submit them for reimbursement with the touch of a button. **This can reduce billing cycle timelines by days and streamline processes by eliminating the need to convert handwritten codes prior to submission.**

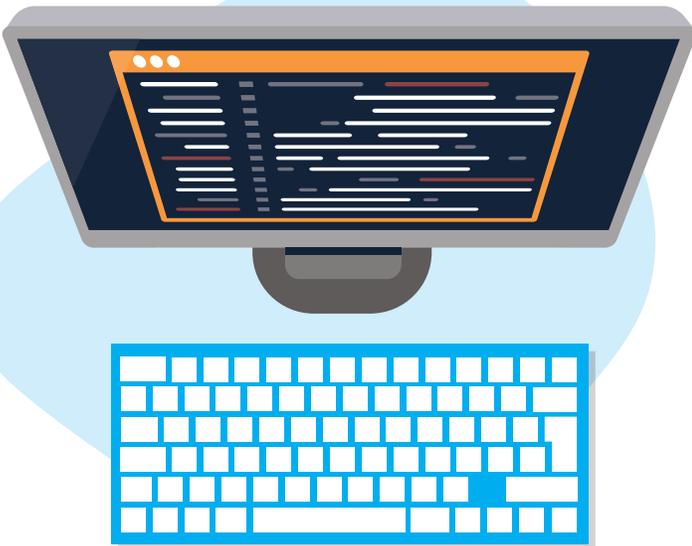
Myth #3

You can even find charge capture software that combines desktop and mobile apps, so a doctor can enter notes on their tablet and the information can be put to use by back-office staff immediately.

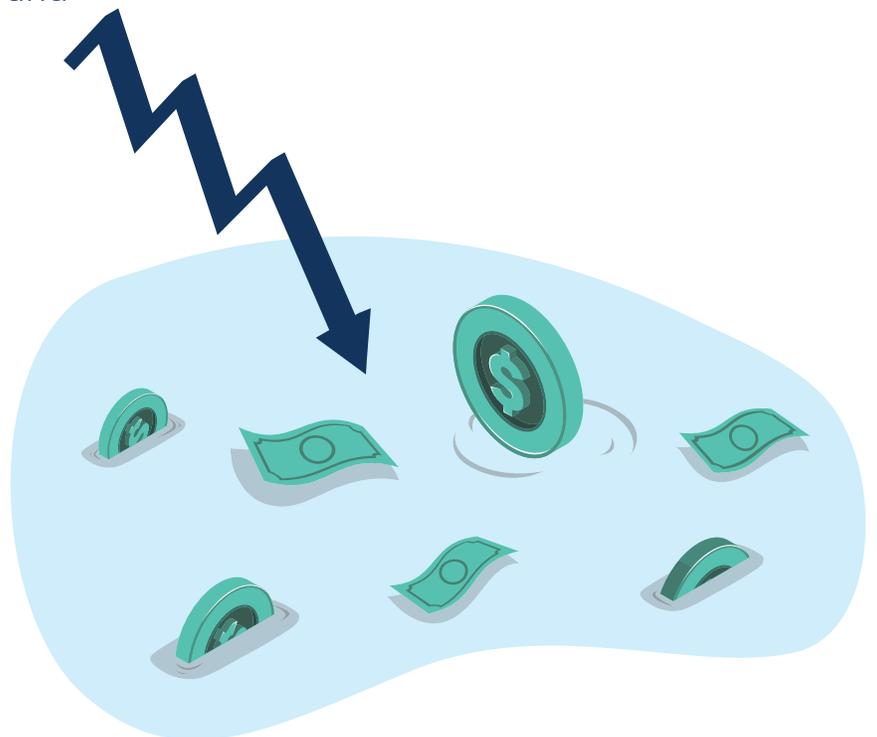
Myth #4

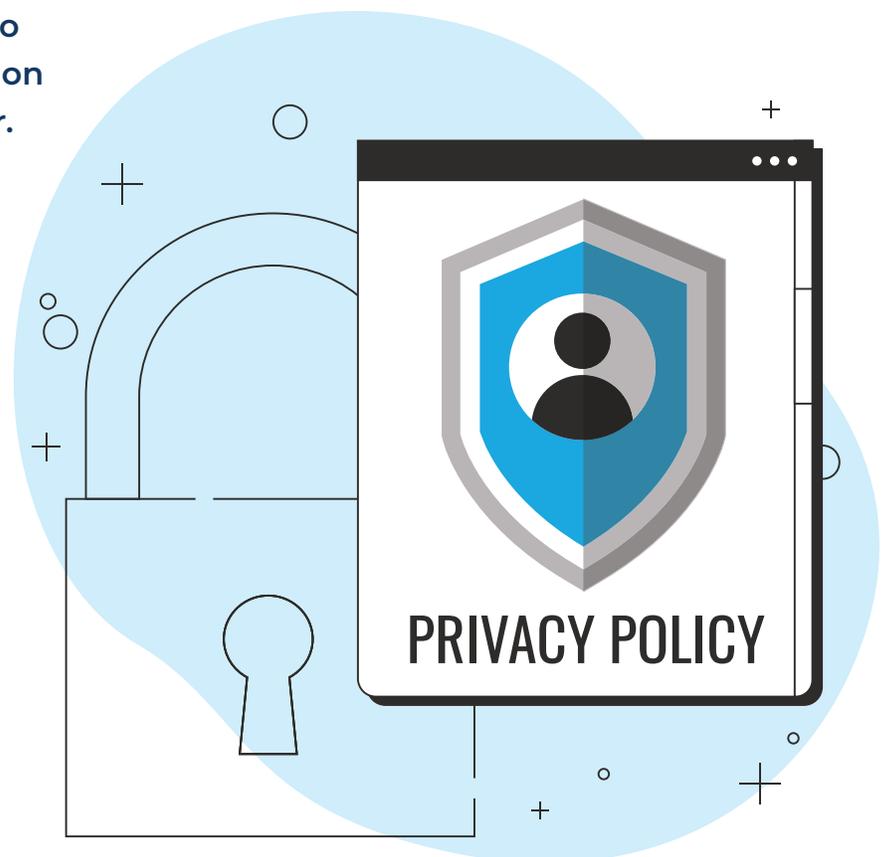
Digital Data Puts Patient Privacy at Risk
